

CHICKEN & BROCCOLI CASSEROLE BY HARRIET BEALE

3 pkgs. (10 oz.) frozen chopped broccoli

4-5 whole chicken breasts

2 cans cream of chicken soup

1 c. mayo.

1 tsp. lemon juice

1 c. grated sharp cheese

1/2 c. toasted bread crumbs

1 tsp. Curry powder

1 tbsp. butter

Cook broccoli, drain, & arrange in 3 qt. baking dish. Place cooked chicken on top. Mix soup, mayo, lemon juice & curry powder & pour over chicken. Sprinkle with cheese and top with bread crumbs tossed with butter. Bake at 350 for 30 min. Serves 8-10



KIRKIN' O' THE TARTANS

In Scotland of old, the Kirk (Church) was very important, and most activities centered around it. The Scottish Highlanders were a war-like people, and there was almost constant conflict between the clans or with England. When a clan or a confederation of clans were making ready for battle, they would meet at the Kirk to have a roll call of clan members. They would also receive their blessings before marching off to war. Later, this became an annual service at which members of the

Highland clans, dressed in their finest tartan colors, rededicated themselves to their Heavenly Father, and praised Him in eternal gratitude for His watching over them during the past year. After the defeat of the Highlanders by the English at the Battle of Culloden in 1746, the wearing of the tartan, the carrying of weapons, and the playing of the bagpipes was against the law. In fact, the bagpipes were declared a weapon of war. As a result, they could no longer have their tartans blessed at their rededication services. The Highlanders, however, began to secretly carry small scraps of tartan material. These tokens of Scottish family and pride were kept in defiance of English rule, to preserve Scottish dignity, and in honor of the family heritage they represented. They would carry these swatches of material, appropriately concealed, to their Kirk to be "Kirked" or blessed. At a time and prearranged signal known only to the clergy and the parishioners, the clansmen and clanswomen would take hold of their tiny pieces of tartan, while the presiding minister blessed the cloth in fluent Gaelic. Being in Gaelic, the language of the Highland Scots, the English soldiers did not understand what was going on.

The Kirkin' o' The Tartans was started in America by Dr. Peter Marshall, a native of Scotland. On April 27, 1941, Dr. Marshall held the first Kirkin' in Washington, DC at what was then known as the New York Avenue Presbyterian Church. This ceremony was based on the old rededication service of the Highland Scots. Dr. Marshall was later named first Chaplain of the U.S. Senate, where he served until his death in 1949. Dr. Marshall's widow, Catherine, recounted her late husband's life, deeds, and services to his Lord in her biography, A Man Called Peter. In 1956, 20th Century-Fox made the book into a movie by the same name. In the movie there was a Kirkin' o' The Tartans, and the idea of the Kirkin' spread across the nation. Churches across the U.S. now have this service, usually on Reformation Sunday. This service has also become a part of most Highland Games that are held across the Nation.
