For the past 12 months we have been in a long period of uncertainty – which is to state the obvious.

It is tempting to want to turn back the clock to 2019, and yet both secular and church consultants are saying that we won't ever return to the normal of 2019.

Instead, we are hearing that we should approach the next 12 months with the expectation that nothing will remain the same. We should prepare ourselves to adapt or die.

As a church, we have been hearing that message for 20 years – and often ignored it. We have chosen to spend most of our time, energy, and resources in preserving a way of life that has truthfully been gone for well over 40 years.

The leadership of our church has not been clueless. Many of you spent hours in contemplating the future as the vision statement and report was prepared. It's time now to put meat on the bones.

Today, First Presbyterian Church has both an incredible challenge and enormous opportunity to reimagine life both "between" and "beyond" the columns.

Some of the changes that will happen in Phase I of the revitalization plan are nothing more than maintenance issues – a facelift so to speak. A plan to repair some of the damage from water leaks.

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When nothing stays the same

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A plan to purge unneeded items from the building in preparation for a new cleaning routine. Upgrades to lighting. A fresh coat of paint.

Some of the changes that will happen in worship are being made to make the services more accessible to unbelievers. Moving the communion table to the floor to remind us that Jesus broke down the barriers between people so that all might have access to the holy. Changing the liturgy in ways that speak less of tradition and ritual and more of relationships while still maintaining the liturgical forms of Reformed worship. Yes, the media enhancement system will add images and graphics to our worship space. Yes, music may be a bit more blended with emphasis placed on developing a cohesive theme each week. Overall, nothing earth shattering.

Where the real revitalization is needed is in how the Spirit leads us in the use of our massive facility. The physical plant of FPC – Danville is the source of both challenge and opportunity for ministry. We must reimagine our life together and how God wants us to reach out into the community. The only way we can discern that adaptive change is through conversation – and not just within our walls.

During this time of Lent when we normally turn introspective, I am asking you instead to have an outward focus. We need a mission and vision that are more than words on a piece of paper. We need to take the gospel message of hope and reconciliation out the doors, down the steps, and into the streets. I can't promise you that it won't be messy far beyond the messiness of ladders, drop cloths, and inconvenience.

It has the potential to be earth shattering and life changing.

In scripture we are reminded of God's ability to breathe life into dry bones. We are reminded that God is always and continually creating and doing new things. We are also reminded not to be dismayed but to be vigilant and to live with anticipation. Pray that our energy will be restored – not for self-preservation but for living into God's new reality.

Guest Column Only to be Opened ...

During the first several months of the COVID-19 pandemic, I helped out during my church's worship service, being one of three participants who were making the service possible on Facebook and YouTube. The Pastor, choirmaster, and I were a sort of "trinity", if you will (The use of the quotation marks and the lower case "t" become obvious, if you think about it just a bit). And if you count the Minister of Discipleship who filmed it, we were a "quadrity" (sounds like something strangely geometrical). After the church opened up again, one-by-one choir members returned, till we had about four or five, singing enmasse (excuse me, I meant to say "enmasked).

During this time, we resumed group Communion by way of an ingenious invention consisting of a small, plastic thimble-shaped, thimble-sized cup consisting of two sealed sections. The lower half contains grape juice (we're Presbyterian), and in the top part, attached to the bottom part, but sealed by itself so it won't get soggy from the blood (grape juice), is the Host (Communion wafer).

On those days when my church offered Communion, one of the Deacons would hand the little purple, white-topped "thimble" to me in his gloved hand as I entered the door so I would have it at-the-ready when the Communion section of the service arrived.

I pocketed them, not because I didn't feel so evil as to not be worthy of partaking and not because of being some strange sort of "This happened about five times, each time



the Deacon continuing to give me the Communal Elements (either he didn't see me leaving early, or it was by his force of habit, or he thought I was so unworthy that I needed his repeated effort). So, over time I have accumulated five of them! I placed them in the kitchen cabinet next to some MRE items I had put back, just in case, during the pandemic. My son, Jeremy also has some MREs and when I told him of where I had stored those Sacramental items, he referred to them as "JCREs"!

About a month ago, when my first COVID Moderna shot was scheduled and having come this far, I stopped attending church altogether, for as I saw it: "No one wants to be the guy who goes up the trench ladder on November 11th, 1918 and gazes out into "no-man's-land" at 10:59 a.m." Due to my co-morbidities, both ministers and the choirmaster agreed (and by the way: "co-morbidities sounds too friendly! They should be "anti-morbidities", or "anti-me").

When I get back to church and Communion time rolls around, I'll take one of those "pre-packaged Sacraments" out of the cupboard to take and use properly at church, for I surely can't administer them to myself! I'll wait for the Minister to tell me to open and consume them; for since we are in a COVID-19 war, I think the general military field ration orders apply: "Only to be opened and consumed under the orders of a commanding officer".

Message from our Missionaries:

Matthew and Teresa Lee, working as our missionaries in Cameroon, West Africa, sent a long letter about their experience in 2020. Just as in the rest of the world, Covid-19 affected their lives, families, and communities. The airports were closed, travel was restricted, and they were confined. However, the situation gave them more time for prayer, family, and rest. Matthew had been scheduled to attend a meeting in Ireland for Bible translators from around the world, but they were able to zoom and drafted a growth plan with the necessary steps, Fortunately, he is able to keep up with international contacts working in his field but lost some connections with more local ministers.

Teresa's school closed but she was comforted by Psalm 46:10: "Be still and know that I am God; I will be exalted among the nations." In March of 2020, Matthew and Teresa were able to celebrate with others for the dedication of the Ndun lectionary. Matthew was recognized for his and other's work in creating the digital template to make this language translation possible.

She played the organ, selected piano pieces, and answered questions about worship leadership, music styles, theological understandings, and many other subjects. When time was running toward the end of the interview, Heather asked the group whether we would like to hear a piece that she especially enjoyed. We said, Sure!, and Heather commenced to "Wow" us with her playing of a Mark Hayes piece. The last six years are now history and we have enjoyed her music style, performance, and leadership since that first interview. She defined herself very clearly and has grown since that time, especially in the quality of her organ performance.

First Presbyterian Church Danville has been blessed with Heather's leadership and has experienced a wide variety of music during her tenure. Revitalization: Phase I


Founded in 1826, we were the first organized congregation in Danville.
