As we prepare to enter the liturgical season of Advent and our world grows darker with the winter time change, our Bible Studies and Sermon Series will turn to the Gospel of John.

John's gospel is set apart in many ways – there is no birth narrative – no baby in the manger. Instead John starts with the familiar words of John 1:1

"In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word

was with God, and the Word was God."

Here, in John, we find the everlasting God.

Woven into the narrative of this gospel – we are lifted above the mundane and into the realm of the sacred. We find John expounding on the doctrinal foundation of Paul in a way that opens the door for intimate relationship. In John, we find the connection between the truth of the Word and the Spirit of the Word that fights against a type of "spiritual boredom" while firmly rooting our faith in the work of Christ.

Join us on Thursdays beginning on Dec. 1 at 10:30 a.m. or 6:30 p.m. to learn of "the light that shines in the darkness".

We begin a sermon series on the Gospel of John during Advent and will proceed with a lectio continua focus on the Gospel of John through Pentecost Sunday.

A Note from Ashley ...

Welcome to the season of Advent! Amid the hustle and bustle of the world, we Christians receive God's gifts of time and waiting. We can redeem a few moments from the busyness of the season to contemplate God's sacrificial love realized through Jesus becoming fully human. Waiting is something we humans try to avoid. We will do just about anything to get what we want, when we want it. Our disdain for waiting is baked into our vernacular language, "Oh, I just can't wait until..."



In reality, we must wait until... whatever it is we are waiting for arrives or occurs. It is humbling to realize even as adults, we have no choice but to wait. We wait for an upcoming promotion, graduation, birthday party, wedding, home renovation, retirement, big vacation, and so on. Even in the everyday, we wait at the grocery store, post office, bank, doctors' offices (They have a whole room dedicated to spending time waiting!). Rather than seeing this as a negative experience "wasting time," let us endeavor to reflect on the gift of waiting. Waiting means we have a purpose, whether in the tangible sense of buying groceries, or in the spiritual sense of celebrating the birth of Christ at Christmas. It also means we have a shared purpose with other people. The experience of waiting together prepares us to set aside time to celebrate together. Scripture illustrates waiting, "But if we hope for what we do not see, through perseverance we wait eagerly for it." (Romans 8:25) Waiting combines time with purpose to produce hope in the human heart. Thank God for Advent! Thank God for time to wait together!

Center for Mission Mobilization

Ian, Stephanie, and their son, Thaddeus, reside in Arkansas working on the International headquarters of the Center for Mission Mobilization.

Currently, 80 percent of the world's Christians live in Asia, the Middle East, Africa, and Latin America, but they send only 20 percent of the world's missionaries. The CMM plants teams of mobilizers in countries like Peru, Kenya, and China to help start mission movements in the global church. Almost 3 billion people are unreached they don't know anyone who knows anything about Jesus—and the CMM is focused on mobilizing the unsent, those who know and love Jesus but aren't engaged in missions, to share the gospel with them.

The CMM engages with students, families and leaders worldwide to point their hearts towards God's Great Commission: go into the world and raise up disciples. Pray for the Lord of the Harvest to raise up more laborers!
