It's hard to believe the first month of 2025 has ended so quickly. February is here and with it the theme of love (Valentine's Day being the main motivator here). Paul writes in his first letter to the Corinthian about love, he says this:

1 Corinthians chapter 13:1-3 English Standard Version

"If I speak in the tongues of men and of angels, but have not love, I am a noisy gong or a clanging cymbal. And if I have prophetic powers, and understand all mysteries and all knowledge, and if I have all faith, so as to remove mountains, but have not love, I am nothing. If I give away all I have, and if I deliver up my body to be burned, but have not love, I gain nothing. Love is patient and kind; love does not envy or boast; it is not arrogant or rude. It does not insist on its own way; it is not irritable or resentful; it does not rejoice at wrongdoing, but rejoices with the truth. Love bears all things, believes all things, hopes all things, endures all things. Love never ends. As for prophecies, they will pass away; as for tongues, they will cease; as for knowledge, it will pass away. For we know in part and we prophesy in part, but when the perfect comes, the partial will pass away. When I was a child, I spoke like a child, I thought like a child, I reasoned like a child. When I became a man, I gave up childish ways. For now we see in a mirror dimly, but then face to face. Now I know in part; then I shall know fully, even as I have been fully known.

So now faith, hope, and love abide, these three; but the greatest of these is love." When Paul writes this, his motivation is describing how useless and even destructive our actions can be and spiritual gifts are when not applied from the standpoint of love. The love Paul uses in this passage is the Greek word agape, often described as unconditional love. It's unconditional in the sense that it doesn't depend on the one being loved, but on the commitment of the one acting. Paul then describes what this unconditional love looks like (the same love that God has for us, we should have for others).

Paul sums it up: Love never fails. Christians may fail to love, as the Corinthians have clearly demonstrated, but God's kind of love will always be effective. And unlike spiritual gifts, which will no longer be needed when Christ comes, love will last forever. While February is a month focused on love, let us learn to love each other with the same love that God has for us, a love that says, "I'm here with you, I'm not going anywhere, and there is nothing you need to do to earn my love." I wonder what the Church would look like if we loved as we were called to love?

February – Worship and Pray Together

It is hard to believe the first month of the year is already over! I hope you have enjoyed the beautiful snow while staying warm and safe! February 1 st marks the beginning of Black History Month. Throughout month, members of our choirs will sing and play several spirituals including, "Go Down, Moses," "Let Us Break Bread Together," and "There Is a Balm in Gilead." I would like to thank my husband, Gregory Robey, for allowing the free use of his choral arrangement of "There is a Balm in Gilead" (circa 2012). Prayerfully, I am also preparing some solo organ arrangements of gospel songs and spirituals by the American composer, Jason Krug.

On the first Sunday of February each year, the Presbyterian Church observes, 'Remember Our Chaplains' in celebration of Four Chaplains Day, February 3rd . This observation began February 3, 1943, after four U.S. Army chaplains gave up their life jackets to save others when the USAT Dorchester sank from a torpedo strike. On this observation, we are asked to pray together for the more than 150 teaching elders serving as chaplains in the United States military, Federal Bureau of Veterans Affairs, Federal Bureau of Prisons, and other national departments. We are encouraged to pray also for all U.S. chaplains. Below is a prayer I adapted from the Presbyterian Council for Chaplains and Military Personnel.

A Prayer for Chaplains

Glorious God, you call us to love and serve, not only with words, but also in presence and actions. Lord, you surround us completely in time, space, and spirit. No matter where we go, you journey with us and use us to reveal your grace and mercy.

We pause to lift your beloved who serve as chaplains. Whether they serve in the military, health care, hospices, palliative care, prisons, with first responders, in commercial industry, or another setting, guide and protect them and magnify your grace through them. Through your chaplains open the eyes of those who fail to see your presence; encourage souls overcome with fear and worry; refresh those wearied from devotion to the works of healing, protecting, providing, and defending. Through your chaplains assuage the anguish of death; give hope during joy and sorrow, chaos and calm, success and failure, rest and exhaustion.

Provide your chaplains with endurance and protect them when they serve in heart wrenching, anxious, and dangerous places. Lord, provide your chaplains with words of comfort and truth, whether they sit beside families of loved ones, staffs of institutions, or leaders of people. May they effuse the peace that comes only from you. Encourage your chaplains to embrace their significance as they help all people. Embolden chaplains to persevere in their essential calling. Gracious God, we give thanks for chaplains. Amen.




You will notice a change in the sanctuary. Session approved moving the communion table back to its original location in the chancel at the last meeting, and the move has been made. The table was moved onto the sanctuary floor to eliminate having to navigate the steps in the chancel while carrying the communion elements. We will continue to serve communion from a table in front of the chancel however we will use the original 1912 communion table. The 1912 communion table will be placed in front of the chancel on Sundays when communion is served. On Sundays when communion is not served the 1912 table will be just outside the sanctuary on the Sutherlin side. When you have an opportunity, please take note of how the design of the 1912 communion table matches the design features of the pulpit chairs and the baptismal font (all original to 1912).
