I cannot believe 2025 is here! Where does time go? With a new year comes the time-honored tradition of New Year Resolutions. I hate New Year Resolutions; I hate them because the overwhelming majority of people (myself included) don't follow through with them. We are left with this feeling of failure (over something that actually was probably good for us to do) and we just forget about trying to attempt it again. But you know what I think we can do, I think we can pray that God will give us new zeal for this new year. A zeal to love Him and love others unabashedly, a zeal like Jesus'. To show and share God's love and to speak in truth and love to a world that needs to hear God's message of the Good News of the saving grace of Jesus the Christ. Someone in your family is going to start arguing over something that doesn't matter (you probably know who), and they'll tell stories and laugh. Eventually the crowd is going to go their separate ways. Every once in a while, your cell phone will ring from people that didn't realize you had died. In a few days your children will go back to work, your employer will begin to search for your replacement. Continued on



Mission Update

The House of Hope, one of the First Presbyterian Church's local missions, is Danville's only emergency shelter for homeless adults and their families. Located on Ridge and Patton Street, the program has served almost 400 people in 2024. The upstairs section, Norma's Place, shelters women and their children. Downstairs, Phil and Fran's Place, serves men and their children and includes two larger rooms for larger families. Norma's Place allows adults with children to remain in the facility 24 hours per day; Phil and Fran's Place stays open during extreme weather conditions for all guests. House of Hope provides emergency shelter for adults and children for up to 30 days along with breakfast, dinner, hygiene products, and a safe, caring facility. Guest supervisors and managers work with guests during their stay to make plans for finding longer term housing and to connect with needed services.

While not a Christian facility, it operates with Christian values of love, kindness and mercy. Operating a daily facility providing these services is expensive. Costs are covered through grants, donations from businesses, groups, and churches ... and lots of individual donations. Another source is the House of Hope's primary fundraiser, Coldest Night of the Year, scheduled at 5:00 p.m. for February 22, 2025. First Presbyterian Church supports this event by sponsoring a team us walk is competitive and either 1 mile or 3 miles) - we are the FPC Chili Walkers. Why that name? Because we provide chili and cornbread (Jackson style) for participants after the race. You can walk and raise funds, support one of our other walkers, and/or help serve chili after the event. FPC also has donated its Ash Wednesday Service offering to the CNOY event. This year, Ash Wednesday is March 5.

Walking in late February at 5:00 p.m. may seem questionable. What many have found though is how, while walking the route in the cold dusk what it must be like for homeless adults and children to walk along in the dark — without light, without food, without adequate clothing. Through your efforts, God helps House of Hope provide warmth, food, clothing and hope — and more importantly the Light of our Lord.



Baked Blueberry Lemon French Toast

Ingredients

1 (12-count) package KING'S HAWAIIAN Original Hawaiian Sweet Dinner Rolls, cubed

1 cup blueberries

1 ½ cups milk

3 large eggs

2 tablespoons maple syrup, or more, to taste

1 tablespoon lemon zest

1 ½ teaspoons vanilla extract

1 teaspoon ground cinnamon

1/4 teaspoon ground nutmeg

For the crumb topping

¼ cup all-purpose flour

¼ cup brown sugar, packed

½ teaspoon ground cinnamon

1/4 cup unsalted butter, cut into cubes

2 tablespoons confectioners' sugar

Instructions

Lightly coat a 9 x 13 baking dish with nonstick spray. Place a layer of bread cubes evenly into the baking dish. Top with blueberries in an even layer, repeating 2 more times and ending with a layer of bread.

In a large glass measuring cup or another bowl, whisk together milk, eggs, maple syrup, lemon zest, vanilla, cinnamon and nutmeg. Pour mixture evenly over the bread cubes. Cover and place in the refrigerator for at least 2 hours or overnight.

Preheat oven to 350 degrees F.

To make the crumb topping, combine flour, sugar and cinnamon in a small bowl. Add cold butter and toss to coat, using your fingers to work the butter into the dry ingredients until it resembles coarse crumbs. Sprinkle the crumb topping evenly over the bread cubes.

Place into oven and bake for 35-45 minutes, or until golden brown.

Serve immediately, sprinkled with confectioners' sugar, if desired.

**I omitted the nutmeg, mainly because I didn't have it when I made it and I think my rolls, were not fresh and it works better if it is not so soft. I used the brand from Aldi which was fine. I only did two layers. 1/2 bread, 1C blueberries, 1/2bread, 1C blueberries. I baked mine for 40 minutes. **

This is one of the delicious dishes from the Outlook's breakfast.
