August - Month of Prayer & Support for Children, Youth, & Young Adults

During the month of August, the Presbyterian Church celebrates, prays for, and supports children, youth, young adults, and students. Each Sunday during the month of August has a focus on supporting young people in the church and our community. On Sunday, August 3rd, we will celebrate College and Young Adult Sunday as well as Youth in the Church and World (August 10th). Please join us as we celebrate our recent high school and college graduates and pray together for all our youth and student members.

The third Sunday of August is designated as Young Adult Volunteers' (YAV) Commissioning. YAVs work as volunteer missionaries across the United States and throughout the world. Some of their site locations include Colombia; Scotland; Peru; the Philippines; Sonora, Mexico; South Korea; Chinook, Montana; New Orleans; New York City; and Tucson, Arizona. When I visited New York in March, Presbyterian Women were supported by a YAV named Bella who was assigned to the Presbytery of New York City.

On August 20th, Presbyterians are called to pray for students, teachers, and employees of our local public schools. Below is a prayer from the study *Loving Our Neighbors* (2010):

A Prayer for Loving Our Neighbors Who Are Children

Creator God, you have entrusted to us the earth and all that is in it and have called us to a wise stewardship of Your good creation. Remind us of our calling to be good stewards of children—all children. Clear our minds of the pervasive rhetoric that would have us view our children as cogs in the wheel of commerce or as products to be turned out, rather than as Your precious and good gifts. Stir us from the apathy that keeps us from reframing the conversation about education to one that names our young people as Your children, created in Your image to serve You in joy. Amen.

Let's pause to pray for all students who have just arrived on campus at a Presbyterian college or university, all faculty and staff, and all their families. CROP HUNGER WALK – OCTOBER 5

Over the past 17 years, the Danville Area CROP Walk has raised nearly \$300,000. Approximately one quarter of the funds stay in Danville and are donated to God's Storehouse. The rest goes to Church World Service, a respected international humanitarian organization transforming communities through just and sustainable responses to hunger, poverty, and disaster. First Presbyterian's Marie Louise Crane was an early organizer of this walk – so it is near and dear to the hearts of many of us.

You can be involved by walking with the First Presbyterian Church team, donating to the CROP Walk, and praying for the growing number of hungry and starving people throughout the world.

PARACLETE MISSION GROUP

(To come alongside Christian leaders around the world)

Paraclete Mission Group comes alongside mission agencies, churches and church planting movements serving around the world. Paraclete associates are experienced missionaries and professionals who use their histories, skills and gifts to partner with individuals and organizations to help them to be effective in life and ministry.

Our mission contact has spent a significant amount of time in partnership with Latin American and Central Asia churches and networks. She has recently supported Latina female workers who were beginning missionary service in Central Asia. These ladies have moved in faith to show and share God's love with Muslim women and children. They are now working with families to teach them to read, discuss health issues and healthy choices for women and children, and help them learn about our Lord. In this country, our Paraclete missionary worked with another woman to offer business training and counseling to Central Asian refugees in an effort to prepare them for making a living and transitioning into their new communities. While helping these women learn new skills needed in life, the new missionaries also had the opportunity to participate in bi-lingual bible study sessions and counsel women and children in crises. In this way, they are spreading the message of our Lord. These missionaries are demonstrating the Word of Jesus in their actions, their conversations, and the love they show these women during a time of great needed.

LOCAL MISSIONS

HOUSE OF HOPE Danville Area Emergency Homeless Shelter

The House of Hope is the only emergency shelter for homeless adults and children in the Danville Area. It has two sections: Norma's Place for women and their children and Phil and Fran's Place housing men and their families. Phil and Fran's Place also offers two rooms for husbands and wives with their children, single parents with more than 3 children, or adults with special needs. The shelter is open seven days per week, 365 days per year. It provides guests with a hot dinner, breakfast, hygiene projects, laundry facilities, access to computers, and a lounge for playing games, reading, and/or watching television. Staff help guests set up appointments for needed services and secure transportation; arrangements are made with local schools to make sure children get to school. While church affiliation is not a requirement for entry to the shelter, the House of Hope operates with Christian values and treats guests with respect and dignity during a low time in their lives.

The shelter opens at 5:00 p.m. each day; guests must leave at 9:00 a.m. However, in the past two years, hours at Norma's Place have been expanded to allow women or men with small children or adults with mobility problems to remain at the shelter during daytime hours. In addition, when the weather is very hot or cold or stormy, the shelter is open for all guests. Unlike many shelters, guests are assured of their same bed for consecutive days as long as they notify staff that they plan to return. The House of Hope collaborates with other service providers to not only ensure that guests have access to needed services, but to plan for a more seamless system for helping guests transition from the shelter back into the community. However, guests at the shelter have a myriad of problems leading to their homelessness. Some have experienced some obstacles (losing a job, being evicted, divorce) that can be overcome with a little help. Others have chronic mental health conditions, physical disabilities, substance abuse histories, criminal records, etc. that require a great deal of support before they can be self-sufficient in the community. Thus, the House of Hope is working with community partners to establish a wrap-around service center next year where guests and other adults at risk of homelessness can meet with community representatives who can help them identify and access the services they need to move toward long-term housing.

The House of Hope is one of the First Presbyterian Church's important local mission partners. Your help – your prayers – are needed. Please ask God to help the homeless citizens of Danville -- and the House of Hope better meet their needs for emergency shelter and transition back into the community.

June 26, 2025 Presbytery Meeting

The meeting was hosted by the churches of Martinsville and Henry County at First Presbyterian Church, Martinsville. There were 97 voting members present and a total of 140 people in attendance. Thirty-nine churches were represented by ruling elder commissioners. The offering for Two-Cents a Meal was \$665.

Worship began with violin solos by Taylor Moore, age 7 and DeShawn Moore, age 8, from Grace Presbyterian. Rev. Jimmie Hawkins, Director, Office of Public Witness, Presbyterian Church (USA) brought the message, "Justice is God's Priority" and participated in a facilitated discussion.

In addition to the business conducted at the meeting, the presbytery recognized retiring pastors Keith Leach, Susi Ennis and Kim Steinhorst and designated them as "Happily Retired". And Peaks' General Presbyter, Carl Utley, was thanked for his service to the presbytery and his retirement was celebrated at a luncheon after the meeting.

Presbytery Actions Taken at the Meeting

- Approved the recommendation from Cabinet for grant funds leftover from Commission on Ministry and Church Partnership
 Commission at the end of the calendar year be rolled over into Justice and Mercy Commission to be additional grant money
 for the coming year to be spent on mission within the bounds of Peaks Presbytery.
- Heard presented from Cabinet Purpose and Priorities for a first reading.
- Approved the request of First Presbyterian Church, Martinsville to call Rev. Dr. Bea Miller as their installed pastor.
- Approved waiving the second language requirement, and the use of accommodations for his 3 remaining Ordination Exams for Rev. Jeffrey Schroeder.
- Appointed an Administrative Commission to dissolve the congregation of Jamestown Presbyterian Church, Rice. The congregation
 no longer has property because they created a legal non-profit cemetery association that has received the cemetery,
 sanctuary, and a third building suitable for receptions. The sanctuary will serve as a cemetery chapel. Financial assets will be
 assigned to the cemetery association to provide money to maintain the cemetery.
- Approved the recommendation from the Justice and Mercy Commission regarding a \$100,000 request from the Presbyterian
 Community Center to be funded from the Williamson Bequest and an additional \$10,000.00 as recommended by the
 Commission on Administration in honor and memory of Helen Dean, for her many endeavors with the Presbytery and PCC,
 bringing the total to \$110,000 approved for the PCC.

Actions Taken on Behalf of the Presbytery Between Meetings

Coordinating Cabinet

Approved to carry over the church redevelopment grants fund for Church Partnership Commission use in 2025.

Commission on Ministry

- Authorized the Ruling Elders who completed training for serving Communion to serve Communion in their respective churches.
- The COM was active in the period between the between the presbytery meetings. You can find that information in full on pages 8-10 of the meeting minutes.

Commission on Administration

- Approved to sell Glasgow Presbyterian Church to the Town of Glasgow for \$100,000.

Justice and Mercy Commission

Church Partnership Commission


