Reminder Sunday School meets every Sunday in the Youth Room upstairs.



Mission Update

Christ for the Island World

First Presbyterian Church supports 9 overseas missions at \$2000 each and 6 local missions at \$100 each.

One of the missions we support is in Indonesia. CFTIW was started in 1983 by Rev. M. Kenneth Taylor from Greensboro, NC. After 13 years in Indonesia, he saw the need to provide support to Bible School and Seminary graduates so that they could spend full-time sharing the gospel of Christ at a fraction of the cost of a imported American missionary. This has proven to be very effective. Thousands have accepted Christ, hearing the Gospel in their own tongue by a native speaker.

Eleven Evangelist and twenty-four outpost pastors and three supervisors receive some support for their ministries. Because Indonesia is so flat they use an inexpensive Ram motor bikes to deliver the clean water to the villages. This was started by a CFTIW missionary. This "Living water" project has been very effective in spreading the gospel! You get clean running water 24 hours; a village, a garden, and a pastor. 50 of these villages have been started.

We thank God for the opportunity to give a little support to this ministry. Thousands have been baptized. The church is alive and growing.


Day School Round Up

In the spring, the session sponsored a clothing drive. It was very successful and prompted one of the helpers to write about her experience. You will see the letter below.

Humbling Experience

On May 3rd, 2025, I experienced an incredibly humbling experience at First Presbyterian Church. A clothing giveaway was being held and I was helping that day. Standing in the hallway, looking towards the front door, I noticed a young woman carrying two backpacks walking in. She ask if it would be ok if she came in and looked for a few clothes. I told her it was absolutely ok and proceeded to show her where the women's items were. As we walked into the first room, I noticed her shoes were slipping on her feet and actually looked like men's slip on tennis shoes. The next thing she told me was heartbreaking. She said she was homeless and needed something to wear to a job interview the following week. I told her I would help her find something. The first thing she noticed was a pair of women's tennis shoes and ask if she could try them on. They fit perfectly and she wanted to know if she could leave them on and put the ones she had been wearing out for someone else that might need them. I encouraged her to see if there was another pair that fit to wear to the job interview. She told me she didn't want to be greedy, but did find another pair and was thrilled. As we moved to another room, she found a coat and several other items that would be appropriate for a job interview. She thanked me for helping her and ask if she could hug me. Of course, I said yes. I told her I would pray for her and wished her good luck with the job interview. As we walked towards the door she. mentioned she had been wanting to start going to church and ask if she could come to First Presbyterian. I told her what time the Sunday morning service was and she would absolutely be welcome to come. I truly wonder how things turned out at the interview.
